#### **Trad Lore 2: The Sprig of Thyme**

Singer Casey Casebeer shares the second of a series of explorations of topics of interest to the folk community. This article initially appeared in the April-May 2024 issue of <u>Local Lore</u>, the newsletter of the <u>Portland FolkMusic Society</u>. Casey is a member of both the Portland and SF clubs.

Plants mentioned in traditional songs had folklore resonance about which singers and listeners would have known. To get another layer of satisfaction out of singing these songs, find out their hidden history.

Many of us had our first musical encounter with the herb called thyme on a recording by Simon and Garfunkel:

Are you going to Scarborough fair? Parsley, sage, rosemary, and thyme.

In this song, a relationship has fallen apart, and the couple are setting each other impossible tasks as a condition for reuniting. Why should thyme be mentioned in this context? Granted, it's a nonsense chorus, but why thyme and not, say, borage, or chamomile? Let's look at another traditional song where thyme is prominent, and see if there's a pattern.



"The Sprig of Thyme" is a very wide-spread traditional song — actually, it's a whole family of closely related songs. A quick visit to Steve Roud's index of folk songs at the Vaughan Williams Memorial Library (see "Further Reading" below for a link) shows that versions of this song

have been collected from oral tradition over 400 times. They go by many titles: "When I Was in My Prime", "The Seeds of Love", "Sweet Thyme", "Come All You Garners Gay".

(Fortunately, all these versions are easy to track down in the Roud Index, because, as varied as they are, they all go by Roud Number 3. See my column in the previous Folknik: "What is a Roud Number?")

These song versions are sung to a variety of tunes, and the lyrics can be quite strikingly different from

one another — an indication that singers have been passing the song around orally, for a good, long time. All members of the family share key phrases along these lines:

Once I had a bunch of thyme
It flourished by night and by day
'Til along there came a (sailor, false young man, etc.)
And he stole all my thyme away.

The songs in this family often equate losing your thyme with losing your lover. This is where the herb rue enters the story.

For when your thyme it is past and gone He'll care no more for you. Every place where your thyme was raised Shall spread all o'er with rue.

In the 18th century there was a fashion for lovers to send each other hidden messages through the "language of flowers". The phrase associated with a gift of thyme was "thyme is to try me" meaning "only with the passage of time can you know to trust my love". By the 19th century, the association for thyme had evolved into "prudence; take your time."

Is this just a play on words, a matter of "thyme" and "time" being homophones, and of "rue" having the additional meaning of "regret"? Consider that those things are true in English, but not in other languages. Rue was introduced to England by the Romans, who called it by its Latin name "ruta". Over time, this became "rue", which by chance sounded like hreow, the Old English word for "regret". In France, however, rue is known as herbe-a-la-belle-fille (pretty girl's herb) or herbe de repentance (herb of penitence). So despite a different linguistic setting, where the word for the herb did not sound like the word for sorrow, rue was still associated with regret in France, just as it was in England. In fact, the folk associations of these herbs reach all the way to the eastern Mediterranean, as we shall see, so it appears that they are not just accidents of the English language.

Looking to the songs themselves for our first clue: what do girls have, that young men try to take from them; that girls' mothers tell them not to give away without due thought; that girls often regret losing? That's right: thyme has a deep history as a symbol of purity, and later of virginity, and its association with rue is no accident.

The word "thyme" comes from the Greek thymus, derived from the word for incense, or the smoke of a sacrifice to the gods. The Greeks and Romans used thyme to purify temples and sacred spaces. The word

may also be related to the Greek word for "will", that is, the concentrated force of the individual mind, themos. Among the Greeks and Romans, thyme came to be associated with self-mastery and courage, and in medieval Europe, thyme was still being embroidered on love tokens for knights to carry into danger.

I'm not proposing that a singing farm worker in 18th century England would have known the Greek origins of the word "thyme". My point is, rather, that objects become symbols, and symbols gather to themselves all kinds of associations, which may remain with a symbol in the form of folklore and songs, long after the origin is forgotten.

People tended to view pungent herbs as potentially powerful. Sweet-smelling thyme and strong, musty rue, like many aromatic herbs, have been used as charms to ward off evil. Thyme was placed under the bed of a woman in labor, to ensure a safe delivery. Rue was hung over windows and doorways to prevent evil influences from entering the home. Rue was even used in herbal mixtures to ward off the Black Death during the Middle Ages. The bitter taste of rue reinforced its association with repentance and atonement. As "herb-ofgrace", a tuft of rue was sometimes used as an aspergillum to sprinkle holy water during Christian church services.



But why do thyme and rue have all these associations? And why should these particular herbs pop up in songs about forsaken women? I speculate that the explanation lies with the plants' household and medicinal uses.

Thyme and rue were two of many aromatic plants used as "strewing" herbs. Others included rosemary, basil, chamomile, geranium, and sweet woodruff. In a time when poor people's floors were earthen and rich people's floors were stone, and when servants slept on the floor, a sweet-smelling layer of fresh rushes was usually laid down. The layer of rushes served to absorb everything from dog effluvia to spilled beer, and was a rich environment for rot and insects. To counteract this, a good housekeeper would regularly add a top layer of fresh aromatic "strewing" herbs to the rushes. Thyme and rue were favorites because they repel insects. (Rue is quite effective against fleas, the vector of transmission for the Black Death, so it may actually have been of some use in that anti-plague charm I mentioned earlier.)

Used by the Greeks for ritual purification, thyme is also mentioned by the ancient authorities as sovereign for cleansing wounds. The active ingredient in thyme is thymol, an effective antibacterial agent, and this use of thyme likely did help to prevent wounds from becoming septic. In fact, a solution of thymol was still being widely used for wound cleansing and surgical dressing as recently as the Crimean War, when it is mentioned by Florence Nightingale.

In addition to these associations with cleanliness and purification, thyme also had a strong association with women's medicine. Thyme is a mild antispasmodic. It has a muscle-relaxant effect on the smooth muscles of the digestive system and the uterus, and was used in case of painful menstrual cramps and to help prevent miscarriage. It was also burned to calm an asthma attack, bronchitis, or cough.

Thyme had its counterpart in rue. Unlike thyme, rue is not much used in cookery after the ancient Romans, because it is powerfully bitter and has dangerous side effects, even in fairly small doses. But it had many medicinal uses. In cases of poisoning, it was administered to cause vomiting. Rue tea causes uterine contractions, so it was used to bring on delayed menses or establish a more regular menstrual cycle, and to encourage uterine contractions in childbirth. It has a mild sedative effect and was used to reduce anxiety and pain.

This brings us to one of the principal uses of rue since ancient times: to end a pregnancy. Ballad-lovers will recall Tam Lin preventing his pregnant lover Janet from pulling "that bitter little herb ... that grows so grey ... to scathe the babe away." Janet's mother had sent her to the woods for rue, to end her unwanted pregnancy.

Modern students of herbal and traditional medicine still contraindicate rue for pregnant women,

but this knowledge has been around for a very long time. Two thousand years ago, the naturalist Pliny the Elder documented rue as an abortifacient, and about a thousand years later, the Muslim physician Avicenna (Ibn Sina) — who is sometimes called the father of modern medicine — also wrote about rue in the context of abortion and birth control. Modern analysis has confirmed that these ideas have a basis in fact, identifying four alkaloids in rue that can prevent implantation of an embryo or lead to a miscarriage. (The word "rue" comes, via Latin, from the Greek verb reuo, meaning "to pour forth or be released", presumably referring to its action in inducing vomiting, menstrual bleeding, and abortion.)

We can see that singers hearing "thyme" or "rue" in a song might well associate the herbs with purity, virginity, self-control, and protection on one hand, and suffering, loss, and mysteriously dangerous "women's matters" on the other.

This puts a different light on the observation in "Come All You Garners Gay", that:

The very same place where the old thyme grew It's all over running, running rue.

# 1960s Folk Music at the hungry i and SF Folk Music Club

San Francisco became a hub for folk music in the 1960s with the help of two institutions: Enrico Banducci's the hungry i nightclub, and Faith Petric's San Francisco Folk Music Club. Banducci debuted and fostered influential performers like the Kingston Trio, while Petric created a long-lasting group of San Francisco folkniks who embraced activism and community.

During the 1950s, American folk music was forced underground by the Red Scare. Folk musicians, whose left-wing political leanings were often interpreted as Communist sympathies, were added to the industry blacklist called "Red Channels" (Driver). Musicians who escaped the jaws of McCarthyism concentrated in pockets of bohemian safe havens around the country. Alongside New York City's Greenwich Village and Chicago, San Francisco claimed a spot as one such gathering ground. With the help of two people — Enrico Banducci of the hungry i nightclub and Faith Craig Petric of the San Francisco Folk Music Club — San Francisco's folk music scene rose to national prominence, leading the 1960's folk revival and shaping the genre for decades afterwards.

Pre-1950s, folk music culture was already present in the United States. It was often associated with social solidarity in leftist contexts, the most prominent of which was the Industrial Workers of the World's "little red book" of protest songs

(Eyerman and Barretta). This focus on social solidarity shifted from giving labor movements a voice to combating the modernization and homogenization of postwar America (Moore). This shift coincided with the emergence of the Beat Generation counterculture, which in part sought to form a nonconforming, collaborative community of creative artists (Moore). San Francisco's North Beach neighborhood's hub of Beat poets and vibrant nightlife scene set it up to be a "fertile, overlapping ground for both Beat culture and folk music enthusiasts" (Cohen 121).

#### THE HUNGRY I

At the center of the North Beach action was Enrico Banducci and his nightclub, the hungry i. Banducci took ownership of the nightclub in 1951, and for twenty years, he ran it as impresario, hand picking comedians, jazz musicians, and folk musicians. The hungry i served as the launchpad for many famous performers: comics Lenny Bruce and Mort Sahl, singer Barbra Streisand, and satirist Tom Lehrer, among others. In addition, the nightclub's red brick wall stage backdrop was the first of its kind and has since become a trademark of comedy clubs. The hungry i's reputation wasn't just limited to the Bay Area: New York Times music critic Howard Taubman called it "the most influential night club west of the Mississippi" (Taubman).

Despite the nightclub's growing fame,
Banducci was careful to maintain a very particular
creative environment in the hungry i. He frowned
upon the one-dimensional, entertainment focus of
other nightclubs and thought of the hungry i as a
theater: "I wanted a place where a lot of expression
went on" (Banducci). When performers didn't meet
his standards, Banducci wasn't afraid to cut them off
with a blackout and end-of-show announcement
(Nachman).

But of the performers he did keep, he held them in high esteem. Himself a gifted concert-violinist respectful of the world of artistry, Banducci expected the same respect from the audience. He banned hecklers and was known to fistfight with those who didn't comply (Nachman). A regular audience member summed up his policy: "At the I, you either listened or left. No in between"). Banducci's protectiveness of his performers was well-received; in the words of comedian Shelley Berman, "Enrico really cared for the talent and watched out for them".

Banducci's focus on the performer and artistic expression, combined with the North Beach location, made the hungry i fertile ground for folk music cultivation. Indeed, one of the hungry i's headline acts, the Kingston Trio, catapulted folk music into national prominence. Formed in 1957, the trio was a group of fresh Bay Area college graduates who began performing in Palo Alto coffee shops, then San Francisco's tiny Purple Onion nightclub (known as the "training ground ... for young performers" (Bareiss). The trio finally moved to the hungry i, which was where they "developed [their] signature sound and early repertoire" in the creative ambience that Banducci fostered (Bareiss).

A year later, the trio released their first album, filled with songs learned from other San Francisco performers they encountered at various nightclubs (Bareiss). Their rendition of "Tom Dooley", an old folk song about a love triangle that ends in murder, instantly topped the charts, selling three million copies and winning a Grammy as the first big hit of the folk music revival (Cohen 131). Their second album was recorded live at the hungry i. The trio's success proved the commercial popularity of folk music and paved the way for folk newcomers like Bob Dylan, Joan Baez, and Phil Ochs (Dreier).

However, the Kingston Trio was not well-received by all. Given the McCarthy era political climate, the trio intentionally steered clear of radical topics, breaking from the folk tradition of decades past and the North Beach Beat culture that had initially shaped them. Folk music magazine columnist Ron Radosh criticized the trio for bringing "good folk music to the level of the worst of Tin Pan Alley [popular] music, and ... even worse ... advertising itself as folk music" (Cohen 136). In the struggle between folk authenticity and commercial popularity, the Kingston Trio chose to sacrifice the former for the latter.

Meanwhile, on the other side of town in Haight-Ashbury, Faith Petric was cultivating San Francisco folk music on a more local stage. Starting in 1962, Petric led the San Francisco Folk Music Club, a group of musicians and music lovers born out of the Cold War era and founded on the belief that "music is the one language capable of transcending national egotism". Under Petric's leadership, the Folk Music Club transformed from a scrappy gathering of high schoolers into a consistent community.

One hallmark of the club was Friday night "Song Swap and Jam" sessions, hosted in Petric's home. Despite lack of advertising, the sessions would regularly draw as many as 100 San Franciscans in its heyday (Marech). In Petric's words, "There'd be so many people in the living room, you couldn't sit down" (Marech). Folk Club members like Richard Rice described the gathering as an "extended family ... like people hanging out, playing on their porches. You don't find that much anymore" (Marech). Through the Friday night jam sessions, Petric fostered an intimate folk music atmosphere similar to Enrico Banducci's hungry i, if not even more tight-knit, collaborative, and long-lasting. Despite Petric's passing in 2013, the jam sessions continue to this day.



While Banducci focused on cultivating a set of impressive, mass-marketable folk music performers like the Kingston Trio, Petric embraced a more grassroots folk music ethos. To her, folk music "tells the truth about history — not just lessons from school about generals and robber barons and politicians. It's about the lives people lived and what happened to them. The tragedies, hopes, dreams — all of that. Folk music is what folks sing" (Vaziri). Petric led by example, bringing her music to her own activism; unlike the Kingston Trio, she did not shy away from political topics. She sang in protests at Selma and against the Vietnam War (Marech), and also co-founded the Freedom Song Network, a group of Bay Area musicians who lend their voices to social activism events (Scherr).

Both Enrico Banducci and Faith Petric fostered their own creative, welcoming San Francisco folk music environments. Banducci focused on identifying and nurturing performers who were at the peak of their art forms and were capable of pushing or even redefining the national boundaries of music during their brief moment in the spotlight. Petric used her own deep passion for folk culture to foster a local, longer-term community of musicians who focused on embodying folk collaboration and activism. Combined, they cemented San Francisco's local and national influence on folk music.

# Song Scope 1: The Murder of the Lawson Family

In each Song Scope, Marlene will examine and discuss the historical background of a chosen song and, at the end, provide links so you can listen to various recordings online.

Many attempts have been made to explain why murder ballads are such a staple of many music traditions. For me, there's no mystery; it's the drama! I'll leave further examination of that question to the musicologists and folklorists. This song is based on a true story from Western North Carolina. It tells the story of what, in recent times, criminologists call a family annihilation.

On a bitter, snowy Christmas Day in 1929, Charlie Lawson, a respected rural tobacco farmer committed one of the most brutal crimes of mass murder ever recorded in U.S. history.

Several weeks before Christmas in 1929, Charlie had taken his wife and seven children into town to buy new clothes and to have a family portrait made. Since they were not very wealthy, this seemed somewhat unusual; some later saw this as a sign of premeditation. These new clothes ultimately became their burial outfits.

On Christmas day, on the farmstead, Charlie killed his wife and all of his family except his 16-year-

old son, whom he had sent into town to buy shotgun shells, supposedly for rabbit hunting. After killing his family, Charlie walked into the woods. When the son returned home and found the bodies, with pillows placed under their heads, he brought the authorities, and they heard a final gunshot, of Charlie killing himself in the woods.

The officer ran down to where the shot was heard to find Charlie dead. Charlie's footprints had encircled a tree several times; it was concluded that Charlie had been pacing around the tree before taking his life. Charlie had on his person two incomplete suicide notes, one of which read "Nobody to blame but ...." the second read "Trouble will cause ...."

Such a gruesome event was bound to raise questions of motive. Possibilities were raised and dismissed -- financial trouble due to the stock market crash? His financial records didn't support it. He had suffered a head injury? An autopsy and analysis of his brain found no abnormalities.



Only after two books were written about the case decades later, in 1990 and 2006, was a more likely cause revealed. Both an anonymous source, two cousins, and the wife's sister-in-law and aunt revealed that Charlie had an incestuous relationship with his eldest daughter, his wife knew about it, and the daughter was pregnant.

The ballad is Roud #697. There seems to be conflicting opinions about the author. However, the most likely candidate seems to be Walter "Kid" Smith. He's given as the writer by Smithsonian Folkways, Doc Watson, and a couple of other sources, so I'm going with that. He was a member of

The Carolina Buddies, and he certainly composed it in haste, since the Carolina Buddies' version of the song was first recorded only three months after the murder, on March 25, 1930. Most subsequent recordings follow that original version pretty closely, including the requisite last verse about the final judgement day.

## May board meeting highlights

**Faith Petric movie:** Estelle gave a report on the Faith Petric movie *Singing for Justice*, which she estimated is 70% done. The movie has been operating with a final completion budget (not total costs) of \$80,000, of which \$40,000 has been raised. The movie has been getting good reviews and has gotten contributions from various folk clubs around the country including Portland, Oregon.

Various venues have been considered for the premiere of the movie when complete, including renting the Freight and Salvage Coffee House, and screening on KQED Presents.

It was moved by Charlie and seconded by Hali that the club donate another \$1,000 to the movie project (in addition to the earlier \$1,000 contribution.) The motion passed unanimously.

Correspondence: Ed was contacted by a woman who refers to herself as No One. She presented an idea for a women-only song swap. The board agreed that this would not be a club function, but if No One organizes it, she will be welcome to publicize it on the Harmony list and the SFFMC Facebook group and submit an article about it to the Folknik.

**Website/Membership:** Daniel's been paying attention to keeping postings current. Paid Membership Pro's recent upgrade has caused some problems that are being dealt with.

**Folknik:** The May-June edition is on the web but not yet on paper. There are around 10 paper copies for each issue and putting them out is a separate task from creating the PDF. Daniel said he would welcome a volunteer taking over the job of sending out the hard copies.

Spring Camp Harmony: Our annual open invitation to musical friends far and near was held via Zoom from the afternoon of Friday, March 8th through Sunday, March 10th. 215 people registered to attend, including 58 first timers. They tuned in from the Bay area, across the continent from Alaska to Nova Scotia, from the British Isles and Europe, Australia, Japan ... and all managed to flow with the U.S. daylight-time shift over Saturday night. We shared three concerts, 39 workshops presented by dozens of folks, with evening music into the nights

(and mornings elsewhere). 57 people volunteered in many capacities to plan and present this event, without whom Spring Harmony would not have been possible. Over 200 registered, over 150 attended.

The SHO committee seeks a volunteer with online/social media publicity skills who can help the club improve its visibility in the virtual world.

Memorial Day weekend: This year, Camp Herms will not be available to us. We will instead gather at Cedar Rose Park at 1300 Rose Street in Berkeley, from noon to 8:30 pm Saturday May 25 and Sunday May 26. The park has a large grassy area and there should be room to spread out to play music, although we cannot schedule workshops.

**4**<sup>th</sup> **of July and Labor Day:** We'll return to Camp Herms high in the El Cerrito hills this year for our 2024 July 4 and Labor Day weekend gatherings. Dates will be July 5-8 and Aug. 30- Sept. 2.

**SFFFF:** Daniel – The program is set and is in the *folknik* though not yet on the website.

**Cyprian's and Tuesday meetings:** Meetings continue, with 12 to 15 attendees at Cyprians. Zoom meeting on Tuesdays and Fridays are "moving along well" with often 25 folks.

**ECFFF:** El Cerrito Arts and Culture has approved our request for support and has sent the club \$1,100 to help finance the festival on October 12. The festival committee has a meeting scheduled for the first week of June. (Note: The festival date was changed to October 20 after the meeting due to the original date conflicting with Yom Kippur.)

Charlie made a motion that the Spring Harmony committee make cards to be passed out at the SFFFF with design approval by the Board. Correspondence: Ed spoke to the woman who goes by the name No One who is fine with setting up an event outside of the Club's auspices. She'll advertise it on the Harmony list and in the folknik.

Camp Herms: Hali called Sean Martin, ranger at Camp Herms on Monday to check in about July 4 and ask about 2025 reservations. He has not yet returned the call. She also emailed Melissa Yarns and Joe Barton Monday about paying the balance for July 4 weekend and is waiting for a reply. She asked about 2025 reservations in the same email and cc'd the Board.

Hali wrote an article for the *folknik* about the successful Memorial Day weekend get-together at Cedar Rose Park in Berkeley.

SFFF: Daniel was unable to be at tonight's meeting but sent this before the meeting in an email: "As you may also recall, parking in the lot at our current festival site is expensive: \$6.25 an hour with a \$33.00 maximum, as per

http://goldengateparking.com. As a gesture toward our volunteers (including performers and workshop leaders), we would like to offer them a partial reimbursement for parking or transit expenses of up to \$10 per driver, or up to \$10 per person for people who take public transit. To ease the logistical burden on SFFMC, we would only offer this by PayPal and would not write checks. Dave told me that he would appreciate help doing the PayPal transactions (because there could be dozens of them) and Marlene agreed to share that work with him. I think

this is something that the committee should be able to decide on our own, but it would be helpful to get the board's ok, too."

Charlie made the motion to approve Daniel's proposal, and Hali seconded. Passed unanimously.

Cyprian's: With the goal of ensuring that all club members who live in San Francisco know that the live meetings have resumed, Daniel sent Ed a list of past and present members who live in SF. Ed sent out an email to this group yesterday and already got three responses. Raymond Tsang would like to set up an Old Time and Celtic group upstairs. He is currently out of the country and will let Ed know when he wants to start. Ed sent Daniel and David Brown this information to publicize this. There are a large number of people in the Old Time and Celtic musical communities who might be interested in this.

Participant numbers have been going down on Zoom but that may be a result of us going into summer and people participating in off-screen activities.

# **Pete Seeger and Malvina Reynolds**


"It was in 1947, at a hootenanny in Los Angeles, a middle-aged woman asked if she could speak to me. 'What is it?' says I. 'Well, I need more time than we have here.' Next day, she came to where I and my small family were staying, and said 'I'd like to try doing what you do: sing for unions, for people trying to do something good in their corner of the world.' I said, well you don't get rich but you meet all sorts of wonderful people. I probably told her to get on the phone when she read the papers about something interesting going on, and tell 'em she had a song that would hit the spot for their meeting. She was 46 or 47, had a shock of beautiful white hair. I was 28; I remember thinking 'Gee, she's kinda old to get started.' I had a lot to learn. Pretty soon she was turning out song after song after song." That's Pete Seeger describing his introduction to Malvina Revnolds.

Malvina and Pete became dear friends.

Malvina Reynolds' songs ultimately found their way into the repertory of entertainers, protesters, teachers, parents, and children all around the world.

Malvina had been writing the occasional popular or political song since her late thirties; by her fifties, she had increased her output and added children's songs to the mix. By the time the folk protest movements of the 1960s came along, Malvina had honed her skills and was ready to take on the issues of the day: civil rights, opposition to the war in Vietnam, the right of workers to organize, and environmental issues. Overall, Malvina wrote

hundreds of songs, some of great beauty and many displaying a sense of humor and wit that has endeared her to performers and listeners from Tennessee to Tokyo.

The video below features a Malvina Reynolds song, one of her lesser-known songs, from the Pete Seeger album, "God Bless the Grass".

The environmental theme of the album gives the quintessential troubadour inspiration. The songs create a statement about the beauty of nature and the foibles of petty politics. Fine songs and masterful singing come together to create a beautiful record which makes the listener want to plant a tree and clean up a filthy river. The album appeals to what is best in us, and that in itself is quite impressive.

"I keep reminding people that an editorial in rhyme is not a song. A good song makes you laugh, it makes you cry, it makes you think." Pete said.


"70 Miles" is a powerful folk song that explores the issue of pollution in San Francisco Bay. Through its poignant lyrics and catchy melody, the song raises awareness about the environmental degradation and the neglect of such a beautiful natural resource.

Pete's ability to convey deep emotions and critical messages through his music is evident in this song. The chorus, "Seventy miles of wind and spray, seventy miles of water, seventy miles of open bay – it's a garbage dump," sets the tone for the entire piece. By likening the bay to a garbage dump, Pete highlights the pollution and disregard for the environment that has taken place.

Malvina's song, even though written in 1966, remains relevant today. The issue of pollution and the disregard for the environment continue to plague our world. By bringing attention to the situation in San Francisco Bay, Malvina encourages listeners to reflect on the consequences of their actions and to strive for a more sustainable future.




#### **Chopping Wood**

by David Bernz

I am writing to you from Pete Seeger's home town of Beacon, NY. I wanted to let you know about a new book that came out last month entitled "Pete Seeger – Chopping Wood – Thoughts and Stories of a Legendary Folksinger."

By way of background, I live in Pete's Hometown of Beacon, NY and eventually became his music producer, winning two Grammy Awards in the process (Best Folk Album 2008 and Best Children's Album 2010). I also recorded a great deal of Pete's spoken word and the book contains minimally edited transcriptions along with commentary, photographs and recollections from friends and musicians, and a short forward by Arlo Guthrie.

Chopping Wood is Pete Seeger up close and personal like never before. Derived from years of conversations between Pete and me, it takes readers on a uniquely personal journey through this legendary folksinger and songwriter's remarkable life and career, in his own words.

Pete unabashedly shares historical and family stories. He tells of learning the banjo, traveling with Woody Guthrie, and finding commercial success with The Weavers; explains how he wrote books and put together songs; delves into controversial subjects like communism and the Peekskill Riots; and highlights those he admired and respected, including Bruce Springsteen, who honored Pete with his Seeger Sessions album in 2006.

The book also tackles subjects such as the 1965 Newport Folk Festival, Pete's relationship to Greenwich Village, and the need for copyright reform. It describes how Pete put his worldview into practice in his local community, how he lived with local hero status in later life, and how Pete and I made recordings together that resulted in two Grammy Awards.

Minimally edited to preserve his trademark cadence, the book is punctuated by historical images and additional commentary I've written, as well as remembrances from other musicians and friends and a foreword by Arlo Guthrie. Readers will hear this gentle, principled man's voice resonate in their own heads and bear witness to his humility and willingness to respect those whose opinions differed greatly from his own—vital qualities in these troubled and divisive times.

For years, Woody had a sign on his guitar, 'This Machine Kills Fascists,' and we'd say, 'Woody, Hitler's dead — why don't you take the sign off?' And he'd say, 'Oh, this fascism comes along whenever the rich people get the generals to do what they want.' It's a good definition of fascism. But then Woody went into the hospital, and that's when I decided to put something on my banjo, but I thought it should be a little different. 'This Machine Surrounds Hate and Forces It to Surrender.'

# My Grandmother's Washburn Parlor Guitar

Words & music by Norm Bowen, 2023

I inherited from my grandmother an 1896 New Model Washburn Parlor Guitar. Family lore held that she had played the guitar when she was an elementary school teacher, before she married my grandfather in 1904. A married woman could not teach in CA until 1928. The entire family was musical; singing, playing the piano, and reciting poetry and stories were common pastimes. In 1955, a daughter had a 33 1/3 rpm recording made of her parents, which has been passed down in the family. It includes The Birds' Ball, a popular song based on the poem of Charles William Bardeen. In two places in the quoted lyrics of Birds' Ball I have added typical children's mis-hearing of the words. My grandmother, Lydia Chase Bowen, received her teaching credential from the California State Normal School in Los Angeles (later UCLA). The references here to curriculum and pedagogy, including the quote from Rousseau, are from the normal school catalog of 1905.

The teacher would sing then the children respond Repeat what they heard, make the sound correspond The paramount goal to "keep interest alive" "The unconscious light tone... of the natural child"

#### **Chorus**

When Grandma was married, she had to resign She couldn't teach the kids with their overactive minds She stayed at the house in their small craftsman home Her children groomed Danny with an old curry comb

She sang for her children the ditties and rhymes
The songs that she learned in the normal school times
But she carefully put her guitar fast away
And never again would take it and play

#### **Chorus**

I still remember her sweet little voice A small hint of mischief if offered a choice They recorded on vinyl a last billet-doux She sang Birdies' Ball and Grandpa sang too

Now music is fading from the grammar school class The budgets are squeezed, they're at an impasse So, they're tossing out singing and much of the rest But I still have the record and I like it the best
