Camp Harmony 2019–2020

Camp Harmony returns to Walker Creek Ranch for our New Year's camp from Friday, December 27 to Wednesday, January 1. Attendees may come for all or part. We welcome newcomers, and if you will be a firsttime attendee, please feel free to email or phone with your questions.

THE VENUE: Walker Creek Ranch, in rural Marin County, is known to some in our community as a great retreat spot for other musical gatherings. Its level site, nestled into surrounding hills, features accessible buildings clustered for convenience.

Facilities include a central dining hall and other spacious halls suitable for dancing, concerts, and large group activities. There are numerous rooms for workshops, Arts & Crafts, and lots of smaller spaces for jamming. The property offers walking trails and a scenic bridge over the Creek. There's even a natural history museum for learning about local flora and fauna.

Housing: Walker Creek offers a range of housing options, and our fees are rated accordingly. This location is remote from any off-site lodging. The online registration form will provide space to explain any accessibility needs. All campers will need to bring their own bedding and towels.

- Dormitories are furnished with bunk beds, and all have easy access to a large central bath house with separate facilities for men and for women. We hope to be able to provide a lower bunk to everyone who wants one.
- Semi-Private lodges have multiple rooms each accommodating 2-5 people. These buildings have a common lounge area, some with kitchenette, and shared internal bathrooms. There are no single rooms available at Walker Creek Ranch. To help keep prices as low as possible, no linens are being provided this year.
- Camping is permitted. A parking lot is designated for RVs (power for some but no hook-ups) and tent camping is available at locations around the grounds. If you live locally and wish to stay off-site, the charge will be the same as camping.

Our registrars will make every effort to situate campers in housing suitable to their needs and preferences.

MEALS: Each camper day starts and ends at 2:00 PM, and includes dinner on the day you arrive, and breakfast and lunch the next day. All meals will be prepared by Walker Creek staff who will do their very best to accommodate individual dietary preferences. When you register you have the option of choosing gluten-free, dairy-free, omnivore, vegetarian, or vegan. If you have additional dietary needs, please contact our registrars.

Musical Meetings

Musical meetings of the San Francisco Folk Music Club are held every 2nd and 4th Friday at Cyprian's ARC, 2097 Turk Street (at Lyon), San Francisco. There is plenty of street parking, but if you can't find anything closer, you may park in the blood bank lot at Turk and Masonic. Cyprian's asks that if we park in the lot, we use a parking pass. Parking passes are stored on the info table right inside the front entrance of the church. You can pull up to the front entrance and step inside to get one before you park. You can keep it in your car for future use since they are not dated.

Singing and jamming start at 8:00 pm; we start clean-up at 11:30 and need to leave by midnight. Two of the rooms require earlier leaving times. Bring finger-food snacks and beverages if you can. Guests are always welcome, and no one is expected to "perform". Cyprian's charges us rent; we ask those who can to donate \$5 to \$10 per evening, but if you can't donate, we still want you to join us!

In consideration of our members' allergies and other concerns, only service animals are permitted at SFFMC events, and all our events are fragrance-free. The wearing of perfumes or heavily-scented products is not permitted. If a situation arises that cannot be easily remedied, members may be asked to show responsibility by taking their pet home or going home to change out of clothing that has picked up the offending scents.

A Celebration of Rise Up Singing by Donna Scarlett



My first encounter with *Rise Up Singing* was in 1997, upon attending my first Friday night folk jam at the home of Faith Petric. I had just driven across the United States with most of my belongings packed into every crevice of my compact car. This was a few months after finding out about SFFMC and attending a Memorial Day campout at Bort Meadow. At Bort Meadow, I met a number of people in our community who became and remain my folk music family (Ed Hilton, Richard Rice, Geri McGilvray, to name a few).

Nestled amongst the various pamphlets and music offerings that Faith had set up near her front entrance was *Rise Up Singing*, its blue cover beckoning me to peruse its contents. As a grad school student of teacher education, I had a really tight budget and thus needed any spare I cash I had for food and rent, yet I lingered near the front door for quite some time, fixated on what I had heard others refer to as the "blue bible". I left that night about \$15 bucks poorer but much more musically richer. Twenty-two years later, I've learned most of the songs within its pages, thanks to various members of our SFFMC folk music community who selflessly taught me chords, melodies, and harmonies, while sharing with me so many beautiful stories of their own experiences with these songs.

Though *Rise Up Singing* was first published in 1988, its actual history spans back to 1973, when Peter Blood, then a camp counselor at Tamarack Farm in Vermont, met all summer with a group of campers to devise a new songbook that would incorporate songs that campers actually wanted to sing but weren't then available in their existing camp songbook. As they worked through the summer, the campers grouped songs into categories, such as "Sea Shanties", "Spirituals", and "Freedom". Peter kept working on the book project after that summer, enlisting help from members of the *Movement for New Society* in West Philadelphia. The first songbook, entitled *Winds of People*, was published informally in 1979 and sold 30,000 copies, mostly by word-of-mouth because some of the songs included in the book weren't fully licensed.

In the early 1980's, co-collaborator Annie Patterson and Peter Blood together approached *Sing Out* and their board of directors. With support from then board members Pete Seeger and his wife, Toshi, *Rise Up Singing* was on its way to becoming a reality. It took another two years to finalize which songs would be included, however, and to secure all of the necessary copyright permissions. Finally, *Rise Up Singing* was published in 1988 and has sold over a million copies since that time. Its long-awaited sequel, *Rise Again*, was published in 2015 and includes over 1,200 additional songs.

Please join Ed Hilton at the El Cerrito Free Folk Festival on Saturday, October 26 as he leads our community through songs from *Rise Up Singing* and *Rise Again*. Originally from the western part of New York state, Dan Weber had spent half a lifetime traveling around the country, including a stint working as a Park Ranger in Utah, before eventually settling in the Pacific Northwest and starting his folksong career. He quickly has risen as an award-winning singer-songwriter known for his authentic songs, soulful singing and entertaining personal stories.

This year, "Ever Since Columbine" won the prestigious Woody Guthrie first prize for songwriting after Dan Weber performed it in July at the Woody Guthrie Folk Festival Festival in Oklahoma. SATURDAY, OCTOBER 26: CHRIS MADEN

Accompanying himself on concertina, Chris Maden hails from Marlborough, Massachusetts. Chris sings chanteys and other sea songs old and new. He is a chantey man on the staff of the Mystic Seaport Museum in Mystic, Connecticut, and has performed at its Sea Music Festival, at the Portsmouth, New Hampshire Maritime Folk Festival, here at our park's Festival of the Sea, and at other East Coast venues.

SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 16: BRASS FARTHING

Brass farthing is a nine-member a cappella group of stalwart lads brought together to sing, raise good cheer, and otherwise make merry in the company of good friends both old and new. They take their inspiration from many historical periods, performing historical, traditional and contemporary songs. Amongst Nancy's many great songs and albums is the great song "I Wanna Be a Dog," which was not only


loved and often sung by our very own Faith Petric (and is still a favorite of many of us), but was actually beamed up to astronauts aboard the space shuttle!

Is Communal Rhythmic Music-Making Unique to Humans?

by Marlene McCall

I am in the process of reading the book Musicophilia by Oliver Sacks. Here's an excerpt I thought folknik readers might find interesting:

"The relationship between motor and auditory systems has been investigated by asking people to tap a beat or, where commands cannot be given verbally (as with infants or animals), by observing whether there is any spontaneous synchronization of movement with an external beat." Aniruddh Patel at the Neurosciences Institute has recently pointed out that "in every culture there is some form of music with a regular beat, a periodic pulse that affords temporal coordination between performers, and elicits synchronized motor response from listeners." This linking of auditory and motor systems seems universal in humans, and shows itself spontaneously, early in life.

"The rather mechanical term "entrainment" is sometimes used in regard to the human tendency to keep time, to make motor responses to rhythm. But research has now shown that so-called responses to rhythm actually precede the external beat. We anticipate the beat, we get rhythmic patterns as soon as we hear them, and we establish internal models or templates of them. These internal templates are astonishingly precise and stable; as Daniel Levitan and Perry Cook have shown, humans have very accurate memories for tempo and rhythm.

to produce the desired affective (and mnemonic) results."

He then proceeds to discuss studies that have attempted, unsuccessfully, to find any non-human species that synchronize movements or vocalizations WITH EACH OTHER, in their natural environments, in the way that humans do. There is clear evidence that some domesticated animals can be trained to sing or dance in time to music, but no clear evidence that they can or will do so absent their human trainers.

And for folks interested in sea shanties and work songs, he also goes on to talk about the neurological reason why music has been used in so many traditions in the context of work, both work that is performed by groups, where simultaneous action is helpful, but also work tasks performed by individuals. This is because of the brain's capacity to make associations with melody, rhythm, and lyrics (and its apparent innate "habit" of doing so).
